


Critical Touchpoints




- Local Direct Service Provision
 - Determine how direct service delivery by LHDs will be affected.
- Partner Service Disruptions



 Determine how LHDs can partner to help with other service delivery efforts in the community and potentially fill shortfalls.




- Under-resourced Population Identification
 - Determine which populations are under-resourced and prioritize based on need, and in some cases, eligibility.





CITY SUPPORT FOR RESIDENTS DURING THE FEDERAL SHUTDOWN





Challenges

- SNAP is one example. We must prepare, as we are likely to face more, similar situations.
- Local agencies/organizations, including LHDs, are expected to continue to provide services <u>despite</u> <u>threat of severely reduced funding.</u>
 - SNAP's expiration will put a strain on WIC for those who are eligible for both. Many families have foregone WIC because SNAP was meeting their needs. Other programs will be similarly affected.





Bridging the Gaps

 - Refuse to underspend.
 - Move money to other lines when allowable.

- Has funding been continued or has it expired?
- What funding is under threat? (e.g. federal level or state level?)
