Fellows will have the opportunity to engage with a variety of currently ongoing federally funded studies examining the sexual, reproductive, and perinatal health of people with disabilities, the Community Living Policy Center, the Community Living Equity Center, the National Center for Disability and Pregnancy Research, and the National Research Center for Parents with Disabilities. They will also have the opportunity to develop their own independent research programs. The fellowship is individualized to meet the professional interests and goals of individual fellows.

We are seeking candidates who are committed to a career in disability and health research, with prior research and training in the field, have an outstanding academic record, and who have received or will receive a doctoral degree by the appointed start state. Applicants with earned doctorates in public health and epidemiology, economics, public policy, social work, and sociology are particularly encouraged.

The fellowship program offers a competitive stipend. In addition, fellows are eligible to enroll in Brandeis University's health and dental insurance programs. The position also includes a travel fund to support the presentation of the fellow's scholarship at scientific conferences. This fellowship is funded by a training grant from the [National Institute on Disability, Independent Living, and Rehabilitation Research](#) (NIDILRR).

Applicants should submit a cover letter, curriculum vitae, a 1-page statement of research interests, abstract of your doctoral dissertation, and three publications or peer-reviewed journal articles. Please include all documents in a single PDF file. Finalist candidates will be asked for three academic or professional letters of reference. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis and will be reviewed when received. Appointment dates are flexible.
