As a Sillerman intern, I was placed at the Schott Foundation in Cambridge. The Schott Foundation's mission is, "to develop and strengthen a broad-based and representative movement to achieve fully resourced, quality pre K-12 public education." The foundation has a unique approach to achieving its mission through advocacy demonstrated in publishing of reports as well as holding conferences and supporting grassroots campaigns; as well as supporting strides in education reform through the awarding of grants.
